Mary Clarkson's Deep Dish Brownies

Ingredients:

3/4 Cup Butter or Margarine, Melted

1 1/2 Cups of Sugar

1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract

3 eggs

3/4 Cup all purpose flour

1/2 cup Hershey's Cocoa

1/2 teaspoon Baking Powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 cup Hershey's Semi-sweet Chocolate chips or Reese's Peanut Butter Chips

Heat Oven to 350 degrees. Grease square pan (8X8X2 inches). In Medium mixing bowl blend melted butter, sugar and vanilla. Add eggs; beat well with spoon. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

ONE YEAR ENDS AND A NEW LEGISLATIVE SESSION BEGINS!

On January 10, 2023 the Texas Legislature will kick off the 88th Legislative Session. While there are many items that we will see from our Texas Republican legislators, there are a few we can be certain will be made a priority all the way up to the Governor, himself. In no particular order, here are some areas of focus we can expect to see over the next five months.

- 1. Property Tax Relief. It is safe to say that no one in Texas would object to lowering property taxes for homeowners, and the Governor has made it clear he intends to work towards just that. He supports taking a portion of the state surplus and using it to reduce property taxes, and if his plan goes accordingly, it will be the largest property tax cut in Texas history. We are looking forward to Texas lawmakers putting a good plan into action.
- 2. Parent empowerment via school choice. School choice is about a fundamental right for parents to have access to the educational environment that serves their children best. Families should have a wide range of high-quality schools or educational options to choose from; such as traditional public schools, public charter schools, private schools, homeschool, or virtual learning. One size does not fit all when it comes to education, and the Governor is ready to support that.
- 3.Enhancing public safety and recovery initiatives. More than \$874.6 million have been appropriated to support crucial public safety and recovery initiatives, such as border security and school safety. These funds will protect communities from the increasing threats from the ongoing border crisis, provide support to the Uvalde community, and boost school security all around. House Speaker Dan Phelan mentioned that school security will be a priority for the Texas House and ensure additional funding is allocated to do so.

Though these are important issues, we can surely expect to see much more coming from our Texas lawmakers during the 88th session. While we didn't quite see the red wave we anticipated at the federal level, Texas Republicans maintained a grip on the state government during the 2022 elections, sending a loud message that we want to keep the Lone Star State "a beacon of opportunity," as Governor Abbott stated. Republicans even narrowly expanded our majorities in both the Texas House and the Texas Senate. We can surely expect a busy and productive legislative session in 2023, and Hays County Republicans are ready to make sure the Lone Star State remains the freest place on earth!
